Personal, Social and Emotional Development

The big question:

What would it be like if the world was frozen?

<u>Understanding the world</u>

- Know that there are different countries in the world and talk about the differences they have experienced or seen in photos
- Recognise some similarities and differences between life in this country and life in other countries
- Understand that some places are special to member of their community
- Explore the natural world around them
- Describe what they see, hear and feel whilst outside

<u>Literacy:</u>

- Phase 2/3 phonics
- Write some letters accurately
- Initial sounds and CVC labels (extend to captions)
- Sequence and retell stories
- Write some or all of their name
- Read individual letters by saying the sounds of them
- Describe events in familiar stories and predict events (join in)
- Blend sounds in words so they can read short words
- Be able to name different parts of a book

<u>Mathematics:</u>

- Explore the concept of 'whole' and 'part' Focus on the composition of 3, 4 and 5
- Practise object counting skills Match numerals to quantities within 10 Verbal counting beyond 20
- Subitise within 5 focusing on die patterns Match numerals to quantities within 5
- Counting focus on ordinality and the 'staircase' pattern See that each number is one more than the previous number
- Focus on 5
- Exploring 2D shapes

<u>Ways to help at home:</u>

• Read with your child daily, and sign their reading record.

•Try to encourage your child to develop their independence for example putting on their own coat
